# **Notes from Chat (Early Childhood)**

- For the parents sending their children to childcare programs: access to childcare, which feeds into overall workforce participation
- Cost of the training but also the cost to attend training (as this has to be done outside of their work day)
- Better pay and benefits is essential for recruiting and attracting more folks into the early childhood workforce. Important to stress how child care workers are essential to parents being able to participate fully in the workforce.
- I think we need to take this recommendation ratio. Seriously and studying the impact of this huge amount of one time Funding. We have a responsibility to account for the impact of this funding. We are grateful for the one time funding we need to document how this funding mAde a difference and what has been accomplished as a result of the funding. This is also necessary to make a case of continuing to understand what has worked
- Nebraska created an entity to address workforce challenges in behavioral health. I wonder if there are relevant/lesson ideas for this conversation? <a href="https://www.unmc.edu/bhecn/about/index.html">https://www.unmc.edu/bhecn/about/index.html</a>

- Is the EC discussion focusing solely on childcare centers/workers/providers? I would offer that EC focus on strengthening families well-being, mental health, relationships, etc. is another avenue to approach. This would be where I would see a network of Children's Museums across the state could help to develop programs that serve the WHOLE family.
- Absolutely this is open/necessary conversation.
- We also make step up to quality mandatory for some providers and not others based on the amount of state funding they receive. I think this needs to be revisited.
- We know that supporting parents of children from birth to age 8 positively impacts the children's success.
- Some parents will start dropping out of the overall workforce
- Data are showing that for US workforce.
- With a high turnover of workforce and challenges related to accessing training, I worry that the quality of care could decline.
- Step up to Quality to ensure access w/one-time funding.
- Translating documents is a one-time cost as well. We need this in child care licensing as well.
- For a time, Nebraska was willing to pay based on enrollment versus attendance during the "emergency time period". This brought in additional revenue. This has been discontinued. While Nebraska pays for up to 5 days of absences each month. If you have to close a classroom due to COVID, you must close for 10 days. That means 5 days of no income.
- This is becoming a big concern in Lincoln with the uptick of Covid in centers.
- Reimbursement for college courses.
- -with cost prohibitiveness of HE.
- Senator Jen Day has a bill (LB 68) that would make paying for the slot a permanent practice. This how
  most private pay clients are required to pay
- Nebraska has a scholarship that pays the majority of cost associated with higher ed for current EC workforce (TEACH). There are current recommendations to expand this program to make it more accessible with these funds.
- Several examples of business sponsored child care programs would be Gallup and First National in Omaha. In several smaller communities, businesses are contributing to the development of community child care.
- Classes in the evening, hybrid, online are also necessary. Flexibility on practicums and student teaching for current workforce is a must.
- I loved hearing that early childhood development is being introduced to high schoolers future parents, not just early childhood providers.
- After school programs play a huge role in serving the whole family. More state funding to supplement
  Title XX and/or CLC funding (as well as changing some of the regulations for school-based programs)
  could be very beneficial. I would be willing to talk about the wrap around services that Completely KIDS
  provides (mental health, access to food, case management, etc) but obviously those aren't one time
  costs...
- Need to consider additional supports needed to partake in family well-being activities, i.e., transportation to and from.

If you can make one transformational change, without thinking about money, that would change the outcomes for the next generation when it comes to Health, what would you do?

- Become the sixth state with a public option health insurance plan. Lack of money somewhere is the root cause of many issues.
- Create a truly integrated system to treat the whole person, all services in easily accessible format.
- Need more step-down residential programs for highly volatile children. More residential beds.
- Poverty prevention, look upstream at prevention efforts.
- Find ways to put money in people's hands, with stimulus-type payments, people can address their immediate problems. In the healthcare space, if people have the resources they need, they can better address their own healthcare challenges. How do we continue to address stigma around mental health, could we address mental health similarly, everyone goes for a checkup regularly, reimagine the system to address the stigma that prevents people from taking the first step.

Based on what you know about ARPA and our conversation today, what ideas or suggestions do you have that we should consider for recommendations to local and/or state entities for Health?

- Workforce shortages can be due to housing and transportation, need to pay them more
- None of the areas are truly separate, will be looking for cross-over themes.
- Look for incentives, scholarships to get people into the workforce

 Strategic use of one-time dollars so as not to create issues down the road; develop infrastructure by developing technology and training for evidence-based practices state-wide; ensure all have tools needed to deliver quality health-care in accessible way; IT development for better connectivity; training of back-office management systems, same-day access, business development and training including understanding costs to fine-tune; utilize telehealth to supplement and help fill gaps, develop more robust system - mental health, substance use, and physical health.

- retention of workforce, building up a pipeline and recruiting.
- technology and workforce
- Improving access from consumer perspective to coverage, affordability, overcoming barriers
- addressing recidivism, staying in contact with folks after they have received services to make sure they can access those services if they need them again
- developing culturally sensitive resources for workforce

- build in surveillance to monitor and to cut down costs through prevention
- robust and timely data collection for all areas of health to target prevention efforts in a timely way

- Managed Care Contracts are expiring; participatory system of developing RFPs and contracts so that stakeholders have input and experts help develop to best serve people, providers, interests of the state

Keeping in mind the problems created due to the pandemic for the Workforce....

If you can make one transformational change, without thinking about money, that would change the outcomes for the next generation when it comes to Workforce what would you do?

- Living wage; if money is not an object, that's what we need.
- Opportunity scholarships for first-generation students; legislature has allocated some money but a need still exists for low-income, first-generation students.
- More connections to trade schools in addition to 4-year institutions.
- Making connections early on; models out there but need to be expanded so students know what they're doing when they leave high school.
- Apprenticeship programs; getting information to high school students, not everyone can afford
  to go to college and not everyone wants to. Apprenticeship programs can help connect these
  students to good paying job opportunities.
- Quality child care that is accessible (affordable) for all. Can't have a workforce without it.
- Finding new ways to recognize the skills and experience of immigrants and refugees from other countries who struggle to do so after moving to the US.
- Workforce housing, affordable child care; having these available would be important for Senator Stinner's district.
- Workforce housing is entry-level housing (\$250k range for metro areas; less in rural Nebraska); issue in rural areas is the jobs might be there but the adequate housing is not.
- Pathways to permanent residency or citizenship.
- Startup capital for entrepreneurs; make it easier to access for, for example, formerly incarcerated people and immigrants.
- Finding ways to get formerly-incarcerated people into the workforce; reduce stigma around their re-entry; provide incentives for companies hiring those workers.

Based on what you know about ARPA and our conversation today, what ideas or suggestions do you have that we should consider for recommendations to local and/or state entities for Workforce?

- Develop the capacity to host events like this one to ensure we are connecting people to the right programs (ensuring these programs are successful and sustainable)
- Infrastructure; how do we address root issues; the opportunity to address those root causes is here with this funding. Could mean researching, etc.
- Accessibility; make it simple for whomever applying; direct application should be accessible regardless of who/what
- The more barriers in place, the less accessible. Collaboration in rural areas?
- Affordable childcare; workforce housing: rural workforce housing fund (direct ARPA towards supply side -- to contractors building single-family homes and on demand side (Affordable Housing Trust Fund); Childcare -- make it easier for people to work in child care; will in the long

- term make it easier to access. Grants for parents to get their children into programs.
- Ensuring that everyday folks have the opportunity to weigh in; how can we be good stewards of these funds and ensure they reflect the needs of our communities (make this information available in different languages and forums; digestible).
- Senator Wayne's bill -- missing middle housing act (urban housing initiative); PPP loans helped employers keep people on payroll; some businesses have not recovered and so some sort of support or loan for those who haven't recovered.

- Would love to see more workplace experience in schools, it seems to be almost absent in schools. Building relationships with industries in school classrooms.
- I think in addition to "create", it's also investing more in shovel-ready programs/strategies we have in NE that are focused on connecting people to H3 industries (such as JAG NE, WIOA programming, etc.)
- Existing programs are severely under-funded and/or restricted currently
- Yes mental health and supports for incarcerated individuals is also key
- Tax incentives for hiring certain populations
- Could we have some funds for pilot programs with promise that would have access to a pot of funds to build some models that could be replicated?
- Extra points for pilot programs who have youth engaged in building the pilot
- TANF could be looked at as a policy that NE doesn't utilize to the greatest extent for parents/children/2Gen approach
- Workforce the people in an area that are available to work
- "Workforce" (from my specific lens) = young people/early employees/first-time jobs/those with limited experience or ed. entering the workforce for the first time/well-trained and educated young employees entering the workforce for the first time

- Expand TANF benefits for young families by lengthening the period of Earned Income Disregards to age 24, which will incentivize young parents to complete a postsecondary degree or credential.
- I would recommend adding language that the pilot programs are aimed at increasing project-based career and technical education
- @Buffalo County/Kearney we are identifying gaps that are voiced by our community around employment. Very broad strokes based on feedback from employers, workforce, education and youth.
